IFHE (est. 1908) is a politically independent and secular international non-profit organization which holds consultative status with the United Nations. It is registered under German law and financed by membership fees and donations.

As the only international organization for Home Economics and related fields, it connects individuals and organizations from over 70 countries and multiple disciplines. Members are students and professionals. The main focus of IFHE is research, education and service.

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The organization is led by an honorary president, regionally balanced executive committee, and two staff based in Bonn, Germany. A delegate assembly (Council) meets every two years and there is a World Congress every four years.

Executive Committee members serve a four-year term. The president and treasurer are elected by the delegate assembly (Council) and representatives from the five IFHE regions are elected at the regional level.

### **Plenary Speakers**



**Terhi Lindqvist** is Development Manager of the Martha Association (Marttaliitto) since 2002. Her fields of expertise are development cooperation in the field of Home Economics and advocacy work in Finland.

Ms. Lindqvist has 25 years of experience of development cooperation work in Burkina Faso, Cameroon, Ethiopia, Swaziland, Malawi, Zambia and Nicaragua. She is founder of tight networks between Finland and over 10 African women's organizations. In Finland she has specialized in work aiming at integration of immigrants to Finnish society, using Home Economics extension work as a method of connecting people. She is past president of the Finnish platform for the International Federation for Home Economics, FIN-IFHE.

**Janneken Smucker** is Professor of History at West Chester University, specializing in digital, public, and oral history, with her research expertise in American quilts. In the classroom, she integrates technology and the humanities, working with students to create digital projects.

Author of *Amish Quilts: Crafting an American Icon* (Johns Hopkins, 2013), Janneken lectures and writes about quilts for popular and academic audiences, and hosts the podcast, *Running Stitch*, drawing on the Quilters' S.O.S. Oral History collection, a project of the non-profit Quilt Alliance. Her current book project, *A New Deal for Quilts*, explores the United States federal government's symbolic and practical use of quilts and quiltmaking during the Great Depression, including the vital role home economists played in sharing expertise with rural women.





**Robert Van Dyke, CFCS**, is a Family and Consumer Sciences Education (FCS) doctoral candidate at Texas Tech University with research focusing on male student and teacher inclusion in the FCS Education classroom.

Robert taught high school for five years, was an advisor for Family, Career and Community Leaders of America, a Career and Technical (CTE) Student Organization integrated into Home Economics classrooms, and helped build community and business partnerships to strengthen the position of FCS in Colorado. Robert is currently the Program Director for CTE Curriculum and Assessment with the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction and works on implementing high-quality CTE programs that meet the demands of students

and the needs of business and industry.


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
